# A Note on Generalized Relative Order $(\alpha, \beta)$ and Generalized Relative Type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a Meromorphic Function with Respect to an Entire Function in the Unit Disc

#### Abstract

In this paper we introduce the idea of generalized relative order $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a meromorphic function with respect to an analytic function in the unit disc $D$ where $\alpha$ and $\beta$ are continuous non-negative on $(-\infty,+\infty)$ functions. Hence we study some basic properties relating to the sum and product theorems of generalized relative order ( $\alpha, \beta$ ) and generalized relative type ( $\alpha, \beta$ ) of a meromorphic function with respect to an analytic function in the unit disc $D$.


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Let us consider the functions which are meromorphic or analytic in the unit disc $D=\{z \in \mathbb{C}:|z|<1\}$ and have unbounded growth according to some specific growth indicator. Also we consider that the reader is familiar with the fundamental results and the standard notations of the Nevanlinna theory in the unit disc $D$ which are available in [6, 9, 12, 13]. Before starting the paper we just summarized the Nevanlinna theory for the reader's convenience. we denote by $n_{f}(r)$ the number of poles of $f$ in $|z| \leq r<1$ where each pole is counted according to its multiplicity. Similarly $\bar{n}_{f}(r)$ stands for the number of distinct poles of $f$ in $|z| \leq r<1$ disregarding the multiplicity. The Nevanlinna's Characteristic function of $f$ is define as $T_{f}(r)=N_{f}(r)+m_{f}(r)$ where the function $N_{f}(r)$ and $m_{f}(r)$ are respectively known as counting function and proximity function which are as follows:

$\left(\bar{N}_{f}(r)=\int_{0}^{r} \frac{\bar{n}_{f}(t)-\bar{n}_{f}(0)}{t} d t+\bar{n}_{f}(0) \log r\right)$.
and
$m_{f}(r)=\frac{1}{2 \pi} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} \log ^{+}\left|f\left(r e^{i \theta}\right)\right| d \theta, \quad$ where
$\log ^{+} x=\max (\log x, 0)$ for all $x \geqslant 0$.
If $f$ is an entire function, then the Nevanlinna's Characteristic function $T_{f}(r)$ of $f$ is defined as
$T_{f}(r)=m_{f}(r)$.
An entire function $f$ is said to have Property (D), if for any $\delta>1, \gamma>0$ and for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1
$\left(M_{f}\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)^{\gamma}\right)^{2} \leq M_{f}\left(\left(\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)^{\gamma}\right)^{\delta}\right)$
where $M_{f}(r)=\max _{|z|=r}|f(z)|$ We define $\exp ^{[k]} x=\exp \left(\exp ^{[k-1]} x\right)$ and $\log ^{[k]} x=\log \left(\log ^{[k-1]} x\right)$ for $x \in[0, \infty)$ and $k \in \mathbb{N}$ where $\mathbb{N}$ be the set of all positive integers. We also denote $\log ^{[0]} x=x, \log ^{[-1]} x=\exp x, \exp { }^{[0]} x=x$ and $\exp ^{[-1]} x=\log x$. In this connection we state the following definition which will be needed in the sequel:
Definition 0.1. Let $f$ be a meromorphic function in $D$. Then, the order $\rho(f)$ and lower order $\lambda(f)$ of $f[12]$ are defined by

\underset{\lambda(f)}{\rho(f)}=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{\inf } \frac{\log T_{f}(r)}{\log \left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)} .
$$

Further, if $f$ is of order $\rho(f)(0<\rho(f)<\infty)$, one may introduced the definitions of type $\sigma(f)$ and lower type $\bar{\sigma}(f)$ of $f$ which are as follows:

However during the last several years many authors have investigated different properties of meromorphic or analytic function in the unit disc $D$ and derived so many great results e.g. [4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11]. The notion of relative order was first introduced by Bernal [1, 2]. Considering this idea, one may give the definition of relative order and relative lower order of a meromorphic function $f$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire function in the following way:
Definition 0.2. If $f$ a meromorphic function $f$ in the unit disc $D$ and $g$ be an entire function, then the relative order and relative lower order of $f$ with respect to $g$, denoted by $\rho_{g}(f)$ and $\lambda_{g}(f)$ respectively are defined by
$\begin{aligned} & \rho_{g}(f) \\ & \lambda_{g}(f)\end{aligned}=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{\inf } \frac{\log T_{g}^{-1} T_{f}(r)}{\log \left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)}$.
Now let $L$ be a class of continuous non-negative on $(-\infty,+\infty)$ function $\alpha$ such that $\alpha(x)=\alpha\left(x_{0}\right) \geq 0$ for $x \leq x_{0}$ with $\alpha(x) \uparrow+\infty$ as $x \rightarrow+\infty$. For any $\alpha \in L$, we say that $\alpha \in L_{1}^{0}$, if $\alpha((1+o(1)) x)=(1+o(1)) \alpha(x)$ as $x \rightarrow+\infty$ and $\alpha \in L_{2}^{0}$, if $\alpha(\exp ((1+o(1)) x))=$ $(1+o(1)) \alpha(\exp (x))$ as $x \rightarrow+\infty$. Finally for any $\alpha \in L$, we also say that $\alpha \in L_{1}$, if $\alpha(c x)=(1+o(1)) \alpha(x)$ as $x_{0} \leq x \rightarrow+\infty$ for each $c \in(0,+\infty)$ and $\alpha \in L_{2}$, if $\alpha(\exp (c x))=(1+o(1)) \alpha(\exp (x))$ as $x_{0} \leq x \rightarrow+\infty$ for each $c \in(0,+\infty)$. Clearly, $L_{1} \subset L_{1}^{0}, L_{2} \subset L_{2}^{0}$ and $L_{2} \subset L_{1}$.

Now considering this, one may introduce the definition of the generalized order $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a meromorphic function in the unit disc $U$ which are as follows:
Definition 0.3. Let $\alpha \in L_{2}$ and $\beta \in L_{1}$. The generalized order $(\alpha, \beta)$ denoted by $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]$ and generalized lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ denoted by $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]$ of a meromorphic function $f$ in the unit disc $U$ are defined as:

\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}^{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]}[f]=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{\inf } \frac{\alpha\left(\exp \left(T_{f}(r)\right)\right)}{\beta\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)} .
$$

Clearly if $\alpha(r)=\log (\log r)$ and $\beta(r)=\log r$, then Definition 0.3 reduces to Definition0.1.
In the case of relative order, it therefore seems reasonable to define suitably the generalized relative order $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a meromorphic function $f$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire function $g$ respectively in the following way:
Definition 0.4. Let $\alpha, \beta \in L_{1}$. Let $f$ be any meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g$ be any entire function. Then generalized relative order $(\alpha, \beta)$ denoted as $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ and generalized relative lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ denoted as $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ of a meromorphic function $f$ with respect to an entire function $g$ are define by
$\begin{aligned} & \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g} \\ & \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}\end{aligned}=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{r \rightarrow 1} \frac{\alpha\left(T_{g}^{-1}\left(T_{f}(r)\right)\right)}{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)}$,
The previous definitions are easily generated as particular cases, e.g. if $\alpha(r)=\beta(r)=\log r$, then Definition 0.4 reduces Definition 0.2 , and if $\alpha(r)=\beta(r)=\log r$ and $g(z)=\exp z$, then Definition 0.4 reduces to first part of Definition 0.1.A meromorphic function $f$ in the unit disc $D$ for which generalized relative order $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to an entire function $g$ are the same is called a function of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g$. Otherwise, $f$ is said to be irregular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g$.

Now in order to refine the above growth scale, one may give the definitions of an another growth indicators, such as generalized relative type $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative lower type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ with respect to another entire function which are as follows:
Definition 0.5. Let $\alpha, \beta \in L_{1}$. Let $f$ be meromorphic in the unit disc $D$ and $g$ be an entire function with $0<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}<\infty$, then the generalized relative type $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative lower type $(\alpha, \beta)$ denoted respectively by $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ and $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ of $f$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to $g$ are respectively defined as follows:
$\frac{\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}}{\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}}=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{\inf } \frac{\exp \left(\alpha\left(T_{g}^{-1}\left(T_{f}(r)\right)\right)\right)}{\left[\exp \left(\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right]^{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}}\right.}$.
Analogously, to determine the relative growth of two meromorphic functions having same non-zero finite generalized relative lower order $(\alpha, \beta)$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to another entire function, one can introduced the definition of generalized relative weak type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a meromorphic $f$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire $g$ of finite positive generalized relative lower order $(\alpha, \beta), \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ in the following way:

Definition 0.6. Let $\alpha, \beta \in L_{1}$. Let $f$ be meromorphic in the unit disc $D$ and $g$ be an entire function having finite positive relative ( $\alpha, \beta$ ) the lower order $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}\left(0<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}<\infty\right)$. Then the generalized relative weak type $(\alpha, \beta), \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ and the growth indicator $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}$ of $f$ with respect to $g$ are defined as :

\end{aligned}=\lim _{r \rightarrow 1} \sup _{\inf } \frac{\exp \left(\alpha\left(T_{g}^{-1}\left(T_{f}(r)\right)\right)\right)}{\left[\exp \left(\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right]^{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g}}\right.}
$$

Here, in this paper, we aim at investigating some basic properties of generalized relative order $\alpha, \beta$ ), generalized relative type ( $\alpha, \beta$ ) and generalized relative weak type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of a meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire function under somewhat different conditions which extend some earlier result (see, e.g., [3]). Henceforth throughout this paper,we assume that $\alpha, \beta \in L_{1}$ and all the growth indicators are non-zero finite.

## 1. Lemmas

In this section we present some lemmas which will be needed in the sequel.
Lemma 1.1. Let $f$ be an entire function which satisfies the Property $(D)$ then for any positive integer $n$ and for all $\delta>1$,
$\left(M_{f}\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)\right)^{n} \leq M_{f}\left(\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right)^{\delta}\right)$
holds for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 .
Lemma 1.1 follows from a result of Bernal [2].
Lemma 1.2. Let $f$ be an entire function. Then
$T_{f}\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right) \leq \log M_{f}\left(\frac{1}{1-r}\right) \leq 3 T_{f}\left(\frac{2}{1-r}\right)$.
for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 .
Lemma 1.2 follows from Theorem 1.6 of [6].

## 2. Main Results

In this section we present the main results of the paper.
Theorem 2.1. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}$ be any entire function such that at least $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$. Also let $g_{1}$ has the Property $(D)$. Then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
The sign of equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ with at least $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ where $i=j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.

Proof. The result is obvious when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=0$. So we suppose that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}>0$. We can clearly assume that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{k}\right]_{g_{1}}$ is finite for $k=1,2$. Now let us consider that $\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}=\Delta$ and $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$.

Now for any arbitrary $\varepsilon>0$ from the definition of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$, we have for a sequence of $r$ tending to 1 that
$T_{f_{1}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[\left(\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}+\varepsilon\right)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]$
i.e., $T_{f_{1}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]$.

Also for any arbitrary $\varepsilon>0$ from the definition of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\left(=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right)$, we obtain for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that
$T_{f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[\left(\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}+\varepsilon\right)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]$
i.e., $T_{f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]$.

Since $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)+T_{f_{2}}(r)+O(1)$, therefore there exists a sequence values of $r$ tending to 1 for which we obtain in view of (2.1) , (2.3) and Lemma 1.2 that
$T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq 2 \log M_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]+O(1)$
i.e., $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq 3 \log M_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]$.

Therefore in view of Lemma 1.1 and Lemma 1.2, we obtain from (2.4) for a sequence values of $r$ tending to 1 and $\sigma>1$ that
$T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq \frac{1}{3} \log \left[M_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]\right]^{9}$
i.e., $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq \frac{1}{3} \log M_{g_{1}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]^{\sigma}\right]$
i.e., $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}\left[2 \alpha^{-1}\left[(\Delta+\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]^{\sigma}\right]$.

Now we get from above by letting $\sigma \rightarrow 1^{+}$
i.e., $\varliminf_{r \rightarrow 1} \frac{\alpha\left(T_{g_{1}}^{-1}\left(T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r)\right)\right)}{\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}}<(\Delta+\varepsilon)$.

Since $\varepsilon>0$ is arbitrary,
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \Delta=\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
Similarly, if we consider that $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ or both $f_{1}$ and $f_{2}$ are of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$, then one can easily verify that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \Delta=\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
Further without loss of any generality, let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $f=f_{1} \pm f_{2}$. Then in view of (2.5) we get that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}}$ $\leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. As, $f_{2}= \pm\left(f-f_{1}\right)$ and in this case we obtain that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$. As we assume that
 Therefore, $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}} \mid i=1,2$ provided $\left.\left.\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]\right]_{g_{1}}$. Thus the theorem is established.

Theorem 2.2. Let $f_{1}$ and $f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}$ be an entire function such that such that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exists and let $g_{1}$ has the Property ( $D$ ). Then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
The sign of equality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
We omit the proof of Theorem 2.2 as it can easily be carried out in the line of Theorem 2.1.
Theorem 2.3. Let $f_{1}$ be a meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exists and let $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property ( $D$ ). Then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
The sign of equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Proof. The result is obvious when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\infty$. So we suppose that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}<\infty$. We can clearly assume that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{k}}$ is finite for $k=1,2$. Further let $\Psi=\min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$. Now for any arbitrary $\varepsilon>0$ from the definition of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{k}}$ where $k=1,2$, we have for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that

i.e, $T_{g_{k}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right] \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)$

Now we obtain from above and Lemma 1.2 for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that
$T_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right] \leq 2 T_{f_{1}}(r)+O(1)$
i.e., $T_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\left[\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]\right]<3 T_{f_{1}}(r)$.

Therefore in view of Lemma 1.1 and Lemma 1.2, we obtain from above for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 and any $\sigma>1$ that

i.e., $\log M_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\left[\frac{\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left[\beta(1-r)^{-1}\right]\right]}{2}\right]^{\frac{1}{9}}<T_{f_{1}}(r)$
i.e., $\log M_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\left[\left(\frac{\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]}{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{\sigma}}\right]<T_{f_{1}}(r)$
i.e., $T_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\left[\left(\frac{\alpha^{-1}\left[(\Psi-\varepsilon)\left\{\beta\left((1-r)^{-1}\right)\right\}\right]}{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{\sigma}}\right]<T_{f_{1}}(r)$

As $\varepsilon>0$ is arbitrary, we get from above by letting $r \rightarrow 1$,
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \geq \Psi=\min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
Now without loss of any generality, we may consider that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $g=g_{1} \pm g_{2}$. Then in view of (2.7) we get that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Further, $g_{1}=\left(g \pm g_{2}\right)$ and in this case we obtain that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$. As we assume that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$, therefore we have $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}$ and hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=$ $\min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$. Therefore, $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}} \mid i=1,2$ provided $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Thus the theorem follows.

Theorem 2.4. Let $f_{1}$ be a meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$.If $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property ( $D$ ), then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
The sign of equality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ with at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{j}$ where $i=j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.

We omit the proof of Theorem 2.4 as it can easily be carried out in the line of Theorem 2.3.
Theorem 2.5. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions. Also let $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property ( $D$ ). Then

$\leq \max \left[\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}, \min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right]$
when the following two conditions holds:
(i) $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ with at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{j}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$; and
(ii) $\rho_{g_{i}}^{(\alpha, \beta)}\left(f_{2}\right)<\rho_{g_{j}}^{(\alpha, \beta)}\left(f_{2}\right)$ with at least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{j}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
The sign of equality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.

Proof. Let the conditions $(i)$ and $(i i)$ of the theorem hold. Therefore in view of Theorem 2.2 and Theorem 2.4 we get that

$=\max \left[\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}\right]$
$\geq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$.
Since $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ hold simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$, we obtain that either $\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}>\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$ or
$\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}>\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$ holds.
Now in view of the conditions $(i)$ and (ii) of the theorem, it follows from above that
either $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$ or $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$
which is the condition for holding equality in (2.8).
Hence the theorem follows.
Theorem 2.6. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions. Also let $g_{1}, g_{2}$ and $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ satisfy the Property ( $D$ ). Then we have
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$
$\geq \min \left[\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\},\left\{\max \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right]$
when the following two conditions holds:
(i) Any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold and at least any one of $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$; and
(ii) Any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ hold and at least any one of $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
The equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
Proof. Suppose that the conditions $(i)$ and $(i i)$ of the theorem holds. Therefore in view of Theorem 2.1 and Theorem 2.3, we obtain that

Since $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$, we get that either $\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}<\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$ or $\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}<\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$ holds.

Since condition $(i)$ and (ii) of the theorem holds, it follows from above that

which is the condition for holding equality in (2.9).
Hence the theorem follows.

Theorem 2.7. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}$ be any entire function such that at least $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$. Also let $g_{1}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
The equality holds when any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold and at least any one of $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ where $i, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.

Proof. Since $T_{f_{1} \cdot f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)+T_{f_{2}}(r)$, therefore applying the same procedure as adopted in Theorem 2.1 we get that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
Now without loss of any generality, let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $f=f_{1} \cdot f_{2}$. Then $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Further, $f_{2}=\frac{f}{f_{1}}$ and $T_{f_{1}}(r)=T_{\frac{1}{f_{1}}}(r)+O(1)$. Therefore $T_{f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{f}(r)+T_{f_{1}}(r)+O(1)$ and in this case we obtain that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$. As we assume that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$, therefore we have $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}}$ and hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}[f]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\max$ $\left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$. Therefore, $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}} \mid i=1,2$ provided $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.

Hence the theorem follows.
Next we prove the result for the quotient $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$, provided $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphic in the unit disc $D$.
Theorem 2.8. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}$ be any entire function such that at least $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$. Also let $g_{1}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$,
provided $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphicin the unit disc $D$. The equality holds when at least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.

Proof. Since $T_{f_{2}}(r)=T_{\frac{1}{f_{2}}}(r)+O(1)$ and $T_{\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}}(r) \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)+T_{\frac{1}{f_{2}}}(r)$, we get in view of Theorem 2.1 that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
Now in order to prove the equality conditions, we discuss the following two cases:
Case I. Suppose $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}(=h)$ satisfies the following condition

Now if possible, let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Therefore from $f_{1}=h \cdot f_{2}$ we get that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ which is a contradiction. Therefore $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and in view of (2.10), we get that

Case II. Suppose $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}(=h)$ satisfies the following condition

Now from $f_{1}=h \cdot f_{2}$ we get that either $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. But according to our assumption $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \not \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Therefore $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and in view of (2.10), we get that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
Hence the theorem follows.
Now we state the following theorem which can easily be carried out in the line of Theorem 2.7 and Theorem 2.8 and therefore its proof is omitted.

Theorem 2.9. Let $f_{1}$ and $f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}$ be any entire function such that such that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ exist. Also let $g_{1}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \max \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}$.
The equality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Similar results hold for the quotient $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$, provided $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphic in the unit disc $D$.

Theorem 2.10. Let $f_{1}$ be a meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exist. Also let $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfy the Property ( $D$ ). Then we have
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
The equality holds when any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold where $i, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$ and $g_{i}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Similar results hold for the quotient $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$, provided $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire and satisfies the Property $(D)$. The equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $g_{1}$ satisfy the Property (D).

Proof. Since $T_{g_{1}} \cdot g_{2}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}(r)+T_{g_{2}}(r)$, therefore applying the same procedure as adopted in Theorem 2.3 we get that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
Now without loss of any generality, we may consider that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $g=g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$. Then $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Further, $g_{1}=\frac{g}{g_{2}}$ and and $T_{g_{2}}(r)=T_{\frac{1}{g_{2}}}(r)+O(1)$. Therefore $T_{g_{1}}(r) \leq T_{g}(r)+T_{g_{2}}(r)+O(1)$ and in this case we obtain that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq$ $\min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$. As we assume that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$, so we have $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}$ and hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g}$ $=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$. Therefore, $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}} \mid i=1,2$ provided $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $g_{1}$ satisfy the Property (D). Hence the first part of the theorem follows.

Now we prove our results for the quotient $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$, provided $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Since $T_{g_{2}}(r)=T_{\frac{1}{g_{2}}}(r)+O(1)$ and $T_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}(r)+T_{\frac{1}{g_{2}}}(r)$, we get in view of Theorem 2.3 that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}^{g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
Now in order to prove the equality conditions, we discuss the following two cases:
Case I. Suppose $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}(=h)$ satisfies the following condition
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Now if possible, let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Therefore from $g_{1}=h \cdot g_{2}$ we get that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$, which is a contradiction. Therefore $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{1}{82}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and in view of (2.11), we get that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.

Case II. Suppose that $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}(=h)$ satisfies the following condition
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Therefore from $g_{1}=h \cdot g_{2}$, we get that either $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}}$ or $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. But according to our assumption $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \ngtr \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Therefore $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and in view of (2.11), we get that
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
Hence the theorem follows.
Theorem 2.11. Let $f_{1}$ be any meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exist. Further let $f_{1}$ be of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$. Also let $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfies the Property $(D)$. Then we have
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}, g_{2}} \geq \min \left\{\boldsymbol{\rho}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$.
The equality holds when any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ where $i, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$ and $g_{i}$ satisfies the Property $(D)$.

Theorem 2.12. Let $f_{1}$ be any meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exist. Further let $f_{1}$ be of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$. Then we have
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}} \geq \min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}$,
provided $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire and satisfies the Property ( $D$ ). The equality holds when at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $g_{1}$ satisfies the Property $(D)$.

We omit the proof of Theorem 2.11 and Theorem 2.12 as those can easily be carried out in the line of Theorem 2.10.
Now we state the following four theorems without their proofs as those can easily be carried out in the line of Theorem 2.5 and Theorem 2.6 respectively.

Theorem 2.13. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions. Also let $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfy the Property ( $D$ ). Then we have

& \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \\
\leq & \max \left[\min \left\{\boldsymbol{\rho}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}, \min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right],
\end{aligned}
$$

when the following two conditions holds:
(i) Any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth ( $\alpha, \beta$ ) with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ and $g_{i}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$; and
(ii) Any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ and $g_{i}$ satisfy the Property (D) for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
The quality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
Theorem 2.14. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions. Also let $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have

\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \geq \min \left[\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}, \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right]
$$

when the following two conditions holds:
(i) Any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold and at least any one of $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$; and
(ii) Any one of $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ hold and at least any one of $f_{j}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
The equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
Theorem 2.15. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphic and $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire. Also let $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have

\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}} \leq \max \left[\min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}, \min \left\{\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right.

when the following two conditions holds:
(i) At least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$; and
(ii) At least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.

The equality holds when $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
Theorem 2.16. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions such that $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphic and $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire. Also let $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$. Then we have

\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}} \geq \min \left[\max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\right\}, \max \left\{\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}\right\}\right]
$$

when the following two conditions hold:
(i) At least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$; and
(ii) At least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{2}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}} \neq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.

The equality holds when $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$.
Next we intend to find out the sum and product theorems of generalized relative type $(\alpha, \beta)$ ( respectively generalized relative lower type $(\alpha, \beta)$ ) and generalized relative weak type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire function taking into consideration of the above theorems.

Theorem 2.17. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions. Also let $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$, $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ be all non-zero and finite.
(A) If any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold for $i, j=1,2 ; i \neq j$, and $g_{1}$ has the Property $(D)$, then
$\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}} \mid i=1,2$.
(B) If any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ for $i, j=1,2 ; i \neq j$ and $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property $(D)$, then
$\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}$ and $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}} \mid i=1,2$.
(C) Assume the functions $f_{1}, f_{2}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ satisfy the following conditions:
(i) Any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$;
(ii) Any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{i}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{j}}$ hold and at least $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to any one of $g_{j}$ for $i=1,2, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$;
(iii) $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{2}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds simultaneously for $i=1,2 ; j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$;
(iv) $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{l}\right]_{g_{m}}=$

then
$\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{l}\right]_{g_{m}} \mid l, m=1,2$
and
$\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{l}\right]_{g_{m}} \mid l, m=1,2$.
Proof. From the definition of generalized relative type $(\alpha, \beta)$ and generalized relative lower type $(\alpha, \beta)$ of meromorphic function $f_{k}$ in the unit disc $D$ with respect to an entire function $g_{l}$, we have for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that

where $\varepsilon>0$ is any arbitrary positive number $k=1,2$ and $l=1,2$.
Case I. Suppose that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold. Also let $\varepsilon(>0)$ be arbitrary. Since $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)+T_{f_{2}}(r)+O(1)$, so in view of (2.12), we get for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that

and in view of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$, and for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 , we can make the term $A$ sufficiently small, i.e. $A<\varepsilon_{1}$. Hence for any $\delta=1+\varepsilon_{1}$, it follows from (2.16) for all $r, 0<r<1$, sufficiently close to 1 that

Since $T_{f_{1} \pm f_{2}}(r) \leq T_{f_{1}}(r)+T_{f_{2}}(r)+O(1)$ for all large $r$, from (2.12) and (2.15), we get for a sequence of values of $r$ tending to 1 , that

The third part of the theorem is a natural consequence of Theorem 2.5 and the first part and second part of the theorem. Hence its proof is omitted.

Also let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$, $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ be all nonzero and finite.

The proof of the third part of the Theorem is omitted as it can be carried out in view of Theorem 2.6 and the above cases.

In the next two theorems we reconsider the equalities in Theorem 2.1 to Theorem 2.4 under somewhat different conditions.
Theorem 2.19. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions.
(A) The following condition is assumed to be satisfied:
(i) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ holds and $g_{1}$ has the Property $(D)$, then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds and $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property $(D)$;
(ii) $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$, then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Proof. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ be any four entire functions satisfying the conditions of the theorem.
Case I. Suppose that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\left(0<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\infty\right)$. Now in view of Theorem 2.2 it is easy to see that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. If possible let
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
Let $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Then in view of the first part of Theorem 2.17 and (2.31) we obtain that $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2} \mp f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=$ $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Similarly with the help of the first part of Theorem 2.17, one can obtain the same conclusion under the hypothesis $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. This proves the first part of the theorem.

Case II. Let us consider that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\left(0<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}<\infty\right), f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$ and $\left(g_{1} \pm g_{2}\right)$ and $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ satisfy the Property (D). Therefore in view of Theorem 2.4 , it follows that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \geq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and if possible let
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Let us consider that $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Then. in view of the proof of the second part of Theorem 2.17 and (2.32) we obtain that $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2} \mp g_{2}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Also in view of the proof of second part of Theorem 2.17 one can derive the same conclusion for the condition $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and therefore the second part of the theorem is established.

(ii) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$;

(ii) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}$;

$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
We omit the proof of Theorem 2.20 as it is a natural consequence of Theorem 2.19.
Theorem 2.21. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions.
(A) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) At least any one of $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$;
(ii) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ holds and $g_{1}$ has the Property $(D)$, then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $f_{1}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ be any three entire functions such that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exists;
(ii) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds and $g_{1} \pm g_{2}$ has the Property $(D)$, then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \pm g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.

Case I. Let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\left(0<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\infty\right)$ and at least $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ and $\left(f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right)$ are of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$. Now, in view of Theorem 2.1, it is easy to see that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. If possible let
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
Let $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Then in view of the proof of the first part of Theorem 2.18 and (2.33) we obtain that $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ $=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2} \mp f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \pm f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. This proves the first part of the theorem.

Also let $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$, $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ be all non-zero and finite.
(A) Assume the functions $f_{1}, f_{2}$ and $g_{1}$ satisfy the following conditions:
(i) Any one of $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{i}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{j}\right]_{g_{1}}$ hold for $i, j=1,2$ and $i \neq j$;
(ii) $g_{1}$ satisfies the Property $(D)$, then

As $T_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}(r) \leq T_{g_{1}}(r)+T_{g_{2}}(r)$, the same procedure as explored in Case IV of Theorem 2.17, one can easily verify that $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right] g_{g_{1}}^{g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{i}} \mid i=1,2$ under the conditions specified in the theorem.

Likewise, if we consider $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ with at least $f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$, then one can verify that $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right] \frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}=\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Sub Case $\mathbf{I}_{\mathbf{A}}$. Let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Since $T_{g}(r)=T_{\frac{1}{g}}(r)+O(1)=T_{\frac{g_{2}}{g_{1}}}(r)+O(1)$, So $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}}=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.

(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:

Hence $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Similarly with the help of the first part of Theorem 2.23, one can obtain the same conclusion under the hypothesis $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. This prove the first part of the theorem.
Case II. Let us consider that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\left(0<\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}<\infty\right), f_{1}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one of $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$. Also $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfy the Property (D). Therefore in view of Theorem 2.11, it follows that $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \geq \rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and if possible let
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}>\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Further suppose that $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Therefore in view of the proof of the second part of Theorem 2.23 and (2.40), we obtain that $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right] \frac{g_{1}, g_{2}}{g_{2}}=\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Likewise in view of the proof of second part of Theorem 2.23, one can obtain the same conclusion under the hypothesis $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ $\neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. This proves the second part of the theorem.

Theorem 2.26. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions.
(A) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $\left(f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right)$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$;
(ii) $\left(g_{1} \cdot g_{2}\right), g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ all satisfy the Property ( $D$ );
(iii) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$;
(iv) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$;
(v) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$; then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $\left(g_{1} \cdot g_{2}\right)$ satisfies the Property $(D)$;
(ii) $f_{1}$ and $f_{2}$ are of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to at least any one $g_{1}$ or $g_{2}$;
(iii) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}$;
(iv) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$;
(v) Either $\sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \sigma_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\sigma}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$; then
$\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}=\rho_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
We omit the proof of Theorem 2.26 as it is a natural consequence of Theorem 2.25.
Theorem 2.27. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions.
(A) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) At least any one of $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$;
(ii) If either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ holds.
(iii) $g_{1}$ satisfies the Property ( $D$ ), then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $f_{1}$ is any meromorphic function in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ are any two entire functions such that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ and $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ exist and $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfy the Property $(D)$;
(ii) If either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds, then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Proof. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions satisfy the conditions of the theorem.

Case I. Let $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}\left(0<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\infty\right), g_{1}$ satisfies the Property (D) and at least $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ be of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$. Now in view of Theorem 2.7 it is easy to see that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \leq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=$ $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. If possible let
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$.
Also let $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Then in view of the proof of first part of Theorem 2.24 and (2.41), we obtain that $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}$ $=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[\frac{f_{1} \cdot f_{2}}{f_{2}}\right]_{g_{1}}=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Analogously, in view of the proof of first part of Theorem 2.24 and using the same technique as above, one can easily derive the same conclusion under the hypothesis $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$. Hence the first part of the theorem is established.

Case II. Let us consider that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}\left(0<\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}, \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}<\infty\right.$ and $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfy the Property (D). Therefore in view of Theorem 2.10, it follows that $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \geq \lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and if possible let
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}>\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
Further let $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Then in view of second part of Theorem 2.24 and (2.42), we obtain that $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=$ $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right] \frac{g_{11} g_{2}}{g_{2}}=\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ which is a contradiction. Hence $\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$. Similarly by second part of Theorem 2.24, we get the same conclusion when $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ and therefore the second part of the theorem follows.

Theorem 2.28. Let $f_{1}, f_{2}$ be any two meromorphic functions in the unit disc $D$ and $g_{1}, g_{2}$ be any two entire functions.
(A) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}, g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$ satisfy the Property ( $D$ );
(ii) At least any one of $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1}$ and $g_{2}$;
(iii) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$;
(iv) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}$;
(v) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$; then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
(B) The following conditions are assumed to be satisfied:
(i) $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ satisfies the Property ( $D$ );
(ii) At least any one of $f_{1}$ or $f_{2}$ is of regular generalized relative growth $(\alpha, \beta)$ with respect to $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$;
(iii) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}$ holds;
(iv) Either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds;
(v) If either $\tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \tau_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ or $\bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}} \neq \bar{\tau}_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$ holds, then
$\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1} \cdot f_{2}\right]_{g_{1} \cdot g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{1}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{1}\right]_{g_{2}}=\lambda_{(\alpha, \beta)}\left[f_{2}\right]_{g_{2}}$.
We omit the proof of Theorem 2.28 as it is a natural consequence of Theorem 2.27.
Remark 2.29. If we take $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ instead of $f_{1} \cdot f_{2}$ and $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ instead of $g_{1} \cdot g_{2}$ where $\frac{f_{1}}{f_{2}}$ is meromorphic in the unit disc $D$ and $\frac{g_{1}}{g_{2}}$ is entire function, and the other conditions of Theorem 2.25, Theorem 2.26, Theorem 2.27 and Theorem 2.28 remain the same, then conclusion of Theorem 2.25, Theorem 2.26, Theorem 2.27 and Theorem 2.28 remains valid.

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
