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From the Editor

Dear Readers of TOJDE;

I am pleased to inform you that Vol.:3, Number:2 issue of The Turkish Online Journal of Distance Education-TOJDE has been issued on the web side <u>http://tojde. anadolu.edu.tr</u> TOJDE is meeting with its readers for the sixth time, since 2000 January.

In this issue place has been given to five articles, two notes for editor, three book and one conference reviews, twelve news, information about five institutions and one journal and three link of Anadolu University which are from China-Hong Kong, India, Lithuania, United Kingdom, Catalunya-Spain, Turkey and the USA according to alphabetical order.

In this issue of TOJDE we added a new section which entitled "Notes for Editor". In this section two notes for editor are published. The first note belongs to Dr. Jim FLOOD, The Open University, the Director of Learning COROUS, from UNITED KINGDOM. His note is on "How learning is changing?" He states that the increasing reference to learning rather than teaching is the main evidence that learning is changing. This changing has a number of implications. And, the second note is sent by Ins. Aysegul TOKBUDAK who is the head of Testing and Researching Unit of The Open Education Faculty, at Anadolu University, Eskisehir, TURKEY. Her note points out the important role of this unit for Anadolu University's distance education applications, processes of preparation exam questions and measurements, quality of questions for the healthy exam in the name of Anadolu University, the Open Education Faculty programmes. In her note, she gives brief information about process of preparing questions for OEF examinations system. I hope her article would be quite informative and interesting for readers of TOJDE.

The first article is dealt with "improving IT development and work with the computer in the SMEs via SAMBITE Project of Leonardo da Vinci Programme ". Written by Assoc. Prof. A. VIDZIUNAS, Dr. A. MICKUS, (Vytautas Magnus University) and Dr.T. VARKALA, Kaunas Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Crafts, from LITHUANIA. Their article is titled as "IT Training Course for Small & Medium Business-Short Review of Leonardo da Vinci Programme SAMBITE Project". Their detailed review of the project presents that small and medium-sized business is the best-developed and widely spread form of business in Europe which enterprises are the most active in adopting innovations, they easily and effectively react to market changes, are open to information and qualification improvements.

The second article is written by Dr. Lisa NEAL from USA. She is Managing Consultant, EDS Digital Learning and she is also Editor in-Chief of "eLearn Magazine". Her article is entitled as "Scenario Building to Plan an e-learning Program". Her article points out that "scenario building is a process that can be effectively used to design an e-learning program. It helps any type of organization to determine the current state and desired state of education or training and to plan how to bridge the gap. Scenario building identifies the key stakeholders, who are typically students or participants, course developers, teachers or facilitators, support staff, and administration.

The third article which is about women students in distance education written by Emily POON WAI-YEE, from The Open University of Hong Kong, CHINA. Article is entitled "How Female Students Cope With Studies In OUHK". In her paper she investigates what

obstacles a female student will have when studying in OUHK, how she is able to overcome all the difficulties and, based on the experiences of students in one course investigating strategies used by successful female students and what student supports can be further provided to facilitate a woman student to complete the course. The 34 female high achievers were asked to participate in this study and 32 of them responded.

The fourth and fifth articles are belong to Dr. Jim FLOOD, The Open University, the Director of Learning COROUS, from UNITED KINGDOM. He mentioned the future of learning in his article which is titled "E-learning - a driver for Continuing Professional Development?". Implicit in the question is the assumption that CPD needs a driver - a mechanism or a system that will somehow provide the means to establish it as the major paradigm for lifelong learning. It might well be that CPD is in need of a makeover so that the values and beliefs that underpin it will be more widely recognised and adopted - but is e-learning the tool for the job? One way of generating some answers to this question is to examine some models of CPD and to explore how these might fit with models of e-learning in a way that could be mutually beneficial. It seems very intresting article which including Flood's different comments. The fifth article which belongs to Dr. FLOOD is entitled as "Read all about it: online learning facing 80% attrition rates". In this article he seeked the answer of "Can it be true that as many as eight out of ten people who begin an e-learning course fail to complete it? The answer is 'yes', and there is evidence that some kinds of e-learning are not very successful; however, it depends on what is meant by 'e' and what is meant by 'learning'.

In this issue's "Reviews" section contains three books and one conference reivews. The book which is reviewed by Dr. Renu NANDA, Faculty Member, Department of Education University of Jammu, from INDIA. It is entitled as "Towards Virtualization: Open and Distance Learning" written and edited by V. Venugopal Reddy and Manjulika, Srivastava, Kogan Page India Pvt. Ltd., 2002, 1-227, ISBN 8175541725. Thus this book explores the wide range of initiatives that are taking place all over the world. Contributors to this book are well known Vice-Chancellors, distinguished policy makers and leading practitioners, internationally renowned theorists and researchers of distance education viz., Desmond Keegan, Michael Moore, Sir John Daniel, Ing Carlos Cruz Limon, Tam Sheung-wai,, Rory McGreal, Mary Oakes Smith, Xingfu Ding, Lorenzo Garcia Aretio, Hassan Zohoor, Ramegowda, Cem S. Sutcu, Albert Sangra, Carla R Payne, Chris Morgan, Cisco M Magagula, Hakur Agustsson, J.W.Kamu, Jae-Woong Kim, Jeannet Kirkwood, Judith Gal-Ezer, Mark Salopeck, Miles Allen, Paul A Kirschner, Ryosuke, Sophie M Delouis, etc.

The second book review is sent by Professor A. Haluk YUKSEL, from Anadolu University, Eskisehir-TURKEY. Dr. YUKSEL who gave his hands since the beginning of TOJDE at least as being reviewer of TOJDE. Here, I would like to send my special thanks one more time to him for his valuable contributions for TOJDE. He reviewed BURGE, Elizabeth J. and HAUGHEY, Margaret's book which is entitled "Using Learning Technologies" and published by Routledge/Falmer, 2001, London. There are 14 papers which are classified in four major parts including the introduction. Instroduction is the first main part, the second major part is entitled as "policy issues", the third major part is entitled as "practice issues" and finally in the fourth part the "quality issues" are discussed. In general, this book can be considered as a collection of "first-hand accounts" from experienced and accomplished learning technology practitioners highlighting issues in using learning technologies for especially flexible, distance and open learning.

The third book review is sent by Ramesh C. SHARMA Regional Director of IGNOU, Haryana, INDIA. He reviewed the book which is writteen and edited by James A. DRAPER and published by Universiti Putra Malaysia Press in 2001. The book is titled as "South & East Asian Adult Education: Chronologies in Commonwealth Countries". The major aim of this

international research project was to record and analyze the chronological development of adult education in the country members of the commonwealth. It traces the developments in the area of adult education since early 1900s to the very latest as for 1999. This project was supported by the Commonwealth of Learning; the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, University of Toronto; the Commonwealth Association for the Education and Training of Adults; and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Institute for Education. The editor of this volume and Project Director, Dr. James A. Draper, is a specialist in comparative and international studies, community development, adult literacy and basic education, and cross cultures studies. Overall he found this document a valuable source and recommended and a rich resource of historical information to all those interested and involved in theory, practice and research in adult education. This is a book that gives a detailed account of how and when various committees and organizations came up, ways in which learning opportunities were organized; and what was the state of affairs.

A conference held by ITU in Istanbul on March 2002.
