Within this perspective and vision, this present issue includes six research papers from diverse settings and methodologies. Edman and Işık, in their paper entitled 'The Few and Far Between Symbiosis of Black and White: Never Intermixed', discuss the colonization from a different perspective and conclude that the intersection point is about the mind, not the physical characteristics and skin color. Ofosu and Fredua-Kwarteng explore internal quality assurance practices at Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons to reach a better organization. The authors find out and recommend that admission standards, assessment practices, funding, accountability, and the workplace experience should be focused on. The third paper by Kahraman and Erdoğan presents the history of Florya as a tourist attraction, starting from its appearance in the 18th century. They support their manuscript with some visual

elements to make readers comprehend and visualize the process more easily and effectively. Next paper by Smieszek focuses on the project method in teaching students with disabilities. He concludes that project method provides many opportunities fro teaching and increases the effectivity of the program/curriculum, especially for special education. Elehe, Onah and Abanobi, in their research paper, compare and contrast item parameters and statistical results using Classical Test Theory (CTT) approach and Item Response Theory (IRT) three parameter logistic model (3PLM). Next paper, by Fei and Aun, presents findings regardin the social exchange mediators and their impact on human resource practices. They use modelling and discuss relevant literature in their paper.

We hope that the issues of our journal shall contribute to the field of interdisciplinary research literature. We thank to the journal editors, authors, reviewers and all the others who have contributed to the preparation process of this issue.
