After months of intensive preparation, we are pleased to be with you with the '23/Religion and Geography' special issue of our journal.

In this special issue, there are extended and revised articles of 14 oral papers presented at the 'Religion and Geography Symposium' held between 05-06 October 2023 in cooperation with the Hitit University, Faculty of Theology and Islamic Sciences Application and Research Centre of our University. The symposium on 'Perception of Geography in Early Islamic Culture (I-IV. Centuries)' brought together researchers specialised in different disciplines such as Islamic History, Hadith, Theology, Tafsir, Sufism, History of Religions, Ancient Greek Language and Literature, and provided a multi-faceted approach to the relationship between religion and geography.

I would like to express my gratitude to the researchers who sent their studies to our journal for publication, to the referees who contributed to our journal with their evaluations of the studies, and to all my team members who put forth great devotion and effort to publish the issue on time.
